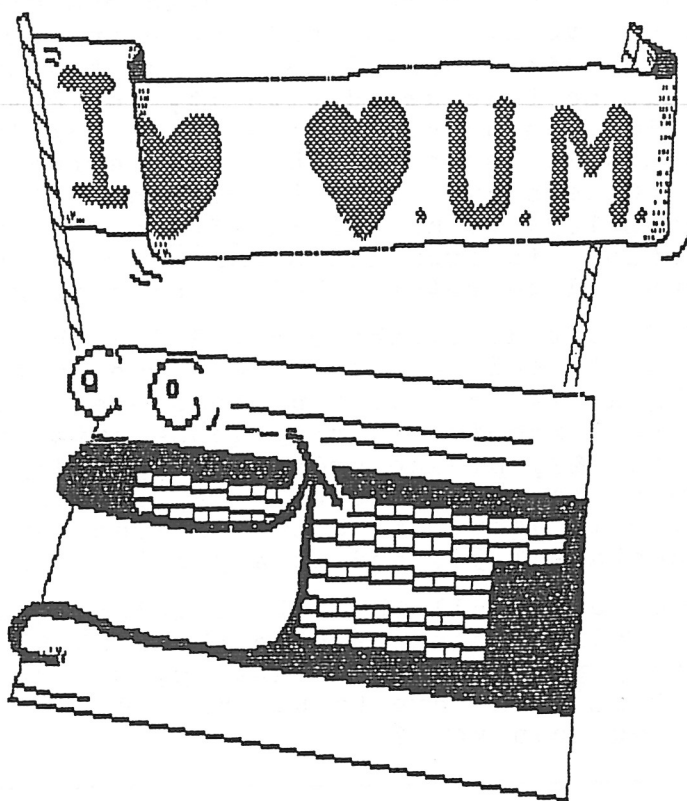

You don't know just how lucky you are to actually be reading this now, I don't think that you have any idea of just how difficult it has been to get this magazine ready on time ! I've had multiples of problems, which leads me onto a couple of apologies, firstly from myself. I would like to apologize to everyone who ordered 'The Haunt' and had to wait over two or three weeks to receive it, despite OUM (Issue 19) stating that it would be sent off within 7 days maximum. Shortly after issue 19 was sent out my faithful cassette-deck gave a dying splutter and finally broke-down on me. I tried to buy an Acorn Alf03 (Oric recommended) but over 5 places I tried were out of stock, as it isn't made anymore. I 'phoned over 20 places trying to obtain a cassette-deck for the Oric, and finally bought one. It didn't work so I returned with it, and got a new one, which also didn't work, all the time the people were waiting for 'The Haunt'. Then I bought an ALBA c190 cassette-recorder which works perfectly, and finally orders were sent off. Orders available to be sent off now, so if you want a copy of the game send £ 1.99 to us and it WILL arrive within 7 days maximum. Second apology is from Allan Whitaker who would like to apologize to all people who had to return their copies of HGC's new release, "Football".

Talking of software...who's not doing their fair share then ? I hear that HGC has yet to sell 25 copies of 'The Last Warrior', which I find very surprising as it is a very professional adventure (from France, converted to English) that received a very good review in OUM and IOU, and costs just £ 4.99 inc. P&P, please order a copy today or you may convince Allan that there isn't enough people willing to cover the production costs. I myself have only sold about 15 copies of 'The Haunt', which I find equally stunning, it only costs £ 1.99, and is a great adventure !! I'll say no more.....

We plan to review all the latest releases, two are looked at this month and more will follow soon. Despite the fact that OUM has nigh on doubled in size (5 to 9 pages) since starting, we are still short of space, and so COMPUTER FILE will have to be omitted from the magazine, you can't have anything now, can you ?

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Review: Indiana Smith  
Supplier: HGC (Mailorder)  
Price: £ 3.50 inc. P&P

I haven't reviewed an Oric adventure for quite a while, so this is a nice change. Indiana Smith is a Quilled adventure that places you as a character who has returned home after drinking one too many of the old lager pints, and you've awoke at an unfamiliar location. You have to find your way to civilisation or wander on lost forever.

This fairly original scenario leads onto a game with little puzzles which didn't give me much of a chance to explore as I couldn't get very far into it, which surprised me a little as I'm usually quite decent at adventures.

The game is not bad, and has nice humourous touches, for example, try typing SCORE and you see the latest world-cup England result ! The vocabulary is a little weak at places, but it shouldn't be an unwelcome addition if you lack a number of adventures in your collection. The price is decent and represents a fair adventure.

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You probably remember that last month's news section looked extremely promising, with the Oric name being under consideration for purchase, and the re-release of the Telestrat, since then I haven't heard anything else about the situation, but this sort of business is often slow so be patient and as soon as anything happens you'll read it hear.

News is good with Simon Houlton being able to supply just about everything ever created (and a few besides) for the Oric. Simon is selling (take a deep breath): Organ Master, Drum machine (not Mick Poats, their own device), Speech Synthesisers (+ software), Numeric Keypad, Datarecorders, Power supplies, disk drives, discs (all sizes), cassettes, dust covers, light pens, Atmos's, Oric 1's 16k/48k, and so much more ! Enough ? No ? Okay then, he can also supply loads of cheap software titles including many French classics such as Vortex, Talisman, Lorigraph and Hyperball. I haven't seen all of the prices but hearing a few then I have to say that you won't find cheaper anywhere else. Demand is high and some stocks are already selling-out, so write/'phone today.

There is a new software title available for ATMOS owners on disk only, it is a great drawing-aid called SKETCH written in BASIC/machine-code by Robert Bray & Neville Clark. It features draw/erase single lines, arcs, circles, and boxes, clear screen, change paper/ink colours, fill shapes, change pattern value, write characters to screen, save/load screens to disk, store screens in memory, swop screen with one already created (in memory), copy/double the size of any part of screen, etc.

This wonderful utility is a HIRES with a help program (17 pages) on the disk, and is available in ORIC DOS V1.1 & SUPER2.DOS. Now, you may already be willing to obtain this and would probably pay about £ 7.95 for it, but the amazing fact is that SKETCH is free ! Just send a formatted disk and 28p in stamps (for return postage) in a padded-envelope (for return post). You can not miss-out on this offer so send off straight away, but remember that it's only ATMOS (not Oric-1) disk users. Address at bottom of page.

As I'm putting this together, it is late March, so the April 1st Alternative Micro Show hasn't taken place yet, so a full report will be printed next issue. The show has many stands and ours features The Haunt, OUM, back-issues, League Soccer, Oric Games Guide, etc. Capri Marketing also have a stand. The stand is run by Dave Dick and Jonathon Haworth, so it should be a hectic day, it'll have taken place by the time you read this.

# DAVE'S DATA!

Written by Alistair Way, this takes 3 minutes to load and initialize. You are at the controls of your space craft and have one hour to save your planet from the KROUTON ship. To get near the KROUTON ship, you must fight through a squadron of different fighter-ships each denoted by string drawings. You set your speed, line up your sights and when in range, shoot with a specific part of your artillery. The manual tells you the name of your attacker and it's strength, etc. When you hit one you are awarded money, which you can use to improve your weaponry. To trade, you go into 'hyperspace' and dock. When in the 'Galactic Shop' you can buy, sell, or pass. You then return to whence you came from, or alternatively you can try to avoid the many mines and do battle with the KROUTON mother-ship.

Cursor keys control your movement, whilst SHIFT, SPACE & RETURN fire various weapons. Set out below is your cockpit view, but please note that your screen display will be more detailed and much more colourful.

Note: as this is not a screen-shot, there will obviously be screen-copy errors, but it simply represents the type of display you will see.

In conclusion, £ 6.50 is a bit pricey for what you get, you might say ; but what about the games you paid £ 8.50 for ? Some of those were alot worse than this. This NEW (1989 copyright !), loads easily and has a manual with it. Graphics & sound are adequate. Although not a classic, it could become quite addictive.

RAMbling in the ROM

Welcome to the first of an occasional series in which I hope to illuminate some of the darker recesses of the various Oric ROMs. It will not all be serious stuff! Just to introduce myself, I bought my first Atmos in April, 1984, and latterly wrote on matters French in 'Your Oric' under the pen-name "Archimedes". It was only after I used the name that Acorn pinched it, honestly!

Just to bring matters French up-to-date, Oric International continues to trade spasmodically in receivership. Alan Whitaker (he of HGC fame) is attempting to introduce here some of the splendid French Oric software, suitably translated where necessary. I hope he can - of the 160 French titles I have, many are equal to or surpass the best English software.

To business, then, and for my first offering - hands up those who knew that Oric U.K. introduced a second version of the V1.1 ROM before they went bankrupt? Everyone is well aware of the spurious loading 'Errors Found' message that attracted such adverse publicity when the Atmos was launched; we all know the purpose of the '\*' programme at the start of commercial tapes. The routine responsible is that at #E4AC which synchronises with the cassette and reads the programme header. The error flag is location #02B1, which is 0 unless errors are detected, in which case it contains 1. If the synchronisation process involves a parity error (as it frequently will) then at #E6F2 in the read byte routine starting at #E6C9, a ROL #02B1 instruction sets the error flag. The first version of the 1.1 ROM omitted to reset this flag to zero after synchronisation and before reading the header, programme name, and the programme code. A perfect load therefore still produced a false error message and prevented autorun.

A comparison of the two routines above shows how Oric optimised the routine to gain three bytes to insert the necessary instruction to zero the flag (STX 02B1). The only section of code that differs in the two versions is that between #E4B6 and #E4D1. Those with the later version 1.1 ROM should have noticed the lack of 'Errors Found' messages when loading programmes without the "\*" programme ahead.

A quick PRINT PEEK(#E4B6) will tell you which version you have. The original ROM will give 162 (=A2), the later version 142 (=8E). As to the date when the change was made, it is shrouded in mystery. Presumably it was after the original batch of ROMs were used up. All I can contribute is that when my first Atmos developed a fault just as Oric U.K. went under, the receiver sent me a brand new one complete with box, manual, leads, etc. for 15 which had the later ROM. Can anyone throw anymore light on the date the later version first appeared?

Just so V1.0 owners don't feel neglected, try CALL #E70E. The routine at this address is never called by the ROM, but in fact prints on the status line "Software by PETER HALFORD and ANDY BROWN", then waits for a keypress before deleting everything but "ANDY BROWN"!! Clearly Andy Brown felt himself worthy of more glory than Mr. Halford! Incidentally, the message itself is stored at #EB8D to #EBB5. V1.1 owners have been deprived of this little nugget.

Enough for the moment. If Robert approves of my ramblings, more may follow!

Changing the subject, I can recommend the ACORN ALF03 data-recorder sold by J & N Bull (see last issue for address), HGC and Simon Houlton, for about £ 16.00. It has a lead which takes power from the Oric and is a superb loader. I can also recommend the ALBA DR-160 which I know loads all titles that I have, except one, which wouldn't load on any. It is available from many shops and Argos for around £ 15.00, comes with lead (no plug, as normal).

# [READERS HELPLINE]

Last month I said that we had too many questions for "Readers Helpline", well some of them were not really suitable for the sections, as some were really better suited to the 'For sale/Wanted' section, and some simply required a yes or no answer, which I answered by post. So, if you have any problems with programming, queries about OUM, software, hardware, etc. then get writing.

Problem: How do you save & re-load variables, for example, in a game you may have £ 220,000, and you can save it. Then, when you play again, you can load in the saved details and have the same money.

From: Arnt Erik Isaksen, Norway.

Answer: " The answer is fairly simple actually, first of all, you must decide which variables you want saving. In our case, lets take them as X, Y and Z. You must then put these variables into an array, which can be any letter, we'll call it B. So, enter the variables values that you wish to save, and to save them, enter:

B(1)=X : B(2)=Y : B(3)=Z

Then you can enter the saving command, which is STORE B,"Filename"

To re-load them, enter RECALL B,"Filename".

Remember, your variables probably won't be X,Y & Z. If your array is more than 9 (if you have more than 9 variables in it) then you'll have to DIM it.

Now, to put the array back into variables, enter X=B(1):Y=B(2):Z=B(3)
